Databases

Available from the KU Libraries' Web site at <http://www.lib.ku.edu>.

L'Annee Philologique

Updated annually. Corresponds to the printed L'Annee Philologique, the international critical and analytical bibliography of ancient Greek and Latin languages and literatures and classical studies. Provides 350,000 bibliographic records for the years 1969 to 1999, with 12,500 new records added each year. The international offices analyze 1,500 periodicals each year as well as 500 articles in collections and conference papers.

WorldCat

Includes millions of records describing items owned by OCLC member libraries, including the KU Libraries.

Google Book Search

Google Book Search is a discovery tool for books. Click a book title and you'll see the Snippet View which, like a card catalog, shows information about the book plus a few snippets - a few sentences of your search term in context. You may also see the Sample Pages View if the publisher or author has given Google permission or the Full Book View if the book is out of copyright. Links are also provided to book reviews, synopses, sources to purchase the book, and to libraries that hold the books.

Google Scholar

Google Scholar enables you to search specifically for scholarly literature, including peer-reviewed papers, theses, books, preprints, abstracts and technical reports from all broad areas of research. Use Google Scholar to find articles from a wide variety of academic publishers, professional societies, preprint repositories and universities, as well as scholarly articles available across the web.

JSTOR

Provides image and full-text online access of core academic journals in a variety of disciplines in the sciences, social sciences, and humanities. Currently provides access to 19 journals in the Classics. JSTOR is not a current issues database. Typically, there is a 1-5 year gap between the most recently published journal and back issues available in JSTOR.

Project Muse

A searchable database that provides online access to current issues of selected scholarly journals in the arts and humanities, social sciences, and mathematics. A list of the journals contained in this database can be found at the Project Muse homepage.

Library of Latin Texts:CLCLT

Full text of Latin texts from the Roman period through the medieval period, including such major authors as Cicero, Virgil, Augustine, Gregory the Great, Anselm, and Thomas Kempis, as well as Neo-Latin Literature (1501-1965), including Reformation and Counter-Reformation texts and modern ecumenical Church councils up to Vatican II.

Expanded Academic ASAP

Provides a combination of indexing, abstracts, images, and full text for scholarly and general interest journals embracing all academic disciplines.

ATLA Religion Database

Indexes religious studies in periodicals, essays in multi-author works, reviews, research, including ancient history and philosophy.

Literature Resource Center

Provides access to biographies, bibliographies and critical analysis of authors from every age and literary discipline. Covers novelists, poets, essayists, journalists and other writers, with in-depth coverage of the most-studied authors. Includes essays on the history of specific publishing companies.

Philosopher's Index

A bibliographic database with author-written abstracts covering scholarly research in all fields of philosophy, published in journals and books.

Arts and Humanities Citation Index (found in Web of Science)

Updated weekly. Contains citations and footnote data on items from more than 1,144 journals, including individually selected relevant items from more than 6,800 science and social sciences journals. Corresponds in part to *Arts & Humanities Citation Index*.

Proquest Dissertations and Theses

PQDT provides online access to over 2 million dissertations and master's theses, many of which are available in full text for immediate downloading. Citations are available for dissertations dating from 1861 and full text online from 1997 for over 1,000 schools submitting to the ProQuest UMI database. More than 55,000 new citations are added to the database every year.

Originally focused on the Archaic and Classical Greek world, the project has expanded into other areas of the humanities including the Duke Databank of Documentary Papyri, the English renaissance literature, a digital archive on the history and topography of London, diary and papers from a 17th century English scientist, and various sections of the Library of Congress's American Memory project. The TGN includes all continents and nations of the modern political world, as well as historical places. It includes physical features and administrative entities, such as cities and nations. Concise essays with abbreviated works cited at the end of each entry.

BL 715 O845 2003 Watson Reference

Provides an categorized annotated bibliography, a thematic index, and brief entries.

Speake, Gaham, ed., *Encyclopedia of Greece and the Hellenic Tradition*, 2000.

DF 757 .E53 2000. vols. 1-2 Watson Reference

This source contains an extensive list of categories, including events, periods, geographic regions, cities, ethnic groups, individuals, and families. There are brief bibliographies after each entry.

Wilson, Nigel, ed. *Encyclopedia of Ancient Greece*, 2006.

This useful resource has several points of entry, including an alphabetical listing of entries, entries arrange by theme, and a list of individuals in chronological order. There are brief bibliographies following each entry.

Very brief entries with a bibliography at the end of the book.

Provides access to information on artists who studied and imitated works from antiquity, scholars of the ancient world, and sites. A brief bibliography follows each entry.
